Homework

Thank you for your feedback regarding the new online maths homework. As mentioned previously, the instant feedback that children receive following the completion of an activity is invaluable to both the child and me as their teacher. Each assessment report also provides a detailed breakdown of which questions each child got correct or incorrect. This then informs my planning and helps identify individual targets for children. Children will soon receive access to a similar site which focuses on spelling and grammar skills.

<u>Spellings</u>

Spelling is taught in class daily; however, children will also bring home the words that they are learning in class to practise at home. These sheets must be returned with their homework on or before the Friday. The number of words assessed will vary depending on your child's spelling focus. Your child will be assessed on these words every Friday. I will also add in extra words that they have not seen, nor practised, but which follow the same spelling rule. There may be some weeks where children do not bring home spellings. This is because, in class, we will be focusing on identifying spelling errors in texts. Of course, that is not to say that children should not practise spelling words. It is a good idea to prompt your child and check that they can read and spell words from the statutory word list. 
Reading

Children are expected to read every day at home. Even in their final year of primary school, children still love to read to their parents and benefit enormously. Please encourage your child to read and sign their diary whenever they do — though it's fine for them to sign it themselves.


TT Rockstars

Children will continue accessing TT Rockstars from school to practise their fluency and speed when recalling times tables and associated division facts. Please remember to continue accessing this at home. This knowledge will be invaluable come the SATs!









Class Story

Our class book, which we will read every day, is 'There's a Boy in the Girls' Bathroom.' The story centres around an unmanageable, but loveable, eleven-year-old who learns to believe in himself when he gets to know the new school counsellor.

Science

In our Light unit, children will learn how light travels, the relationship between light sources and shadows and how the human eye sees- we will make a 3D model!

Amongst other things, we will create shadow puppets to show how light travels and to demonstrate that a shadow has the same shape as the object that casts them; make periscopes to see things that are out of sight; and research how mirrors are used in different contexts (e.g. rear view mirrors, on a dangerous bend) and explain why and how they work.

Computing

This half-term, we will be learning 'what makes an excellent film?' Children will learn how to create a short video and, as they progress through the unit, they will develop the skills of capturing, editing and manipulating video.
